Summary of the homily delivered by Fr. Edward D'Souza during the Jubilee Mass

Today, I would like to invite all of us to reflect on a phrase, that I wish to present to you this evening namely Being a Double for Christ. Years ago, in the early 60s we often used to hear about Stunt men performing various sorts of difficult and dangerous tasks during the shooting of a film. These were people who were able to

imitate the real actors very closely and they would perform many difficult or apparently impossible stunts, in place of the real actors. They were called "The Doubles "They would fly an airplane, dive into the deep sea, engage in martial arts, walk on a tight rope and so on and so forth. They imitated the actors, perfectly and performed marvellous deeds in the place of an actor. These were those whom the film industry called the Doubles.



For me, every priest or religious is called to be a double for Jesus Christ. He or she is called to act in the name of Jesus.... And for Jesus doing exactly what Jesus would have done. Being a double for Christ, a priest or a religious is called to perform acts that would even seem impossible...while faithfully imitating he person of Christ. A priest or a religious is truly a Stunt person acting in the name of Jesus and called to perform innumerable stunts for the Lord, while proclaiming the Good news that Jesus is very much alive even today and inviting many to the feet of Jesus. A priest or a religious is truly a double for Christ enacting stunts, to be able to endear himself or herself to the youth of our times; a priest or a religious is a double for Christ engaged in various stunts so as to go down to the level of the poor, the marginalized and raise them up as precious children to be a double for Christ by performing stunts in the name of Jesus and in the place of Jesus in order to bring love, peace, joy and happiness in this world, as Jesus did many, many years ago.

Being a double for Christ means "Being at His Service" day in and day out, in times of joy and in times of suffering, when things seem easy or even when things seem difficult. I remember that 46 years ago I left Goa to come and work in N.E. India.

As a Salesian, I was even able to convince my companion, the late Fr. Albano to join me. Greatly desired to be a missionary, but there was no opportunity for that, even after my ordination, as my then provincial would not allow me to leave the Province since the Province was only recently established. But then came a moment, when in the 1970s foreign missionaries working in Assam, were given a quit order by the central Govt. There was at that time, an urgent need for confreres to help out in the missions of Assam. It was then that our Superiors in Rome sent a letter to all provincials in India requesting them to permit any Salesian who was interested in assisting the Missions of Assam.

When permission was granted, we paid a visit to the remains of St. Francis Xavier in Goa and fervently asked for his blessings to be zealous missionaries as he was, eager to bring souls to Christ. But as I left my beautiful land Goa, I began to ask myself: "would it be Ok. To work for just three years in the missions and then return to Goa to continue the work of the Oratory, where I had involved myself completely as a young priest, and had spent some of the best years

of my early priestly Life? However, on reflecting later, I questioned myself saying: "would that involve "Being at his service" at the Service of Christ, as Double for Christ?

Three years went by, and today it is 46 years of life in the missions and I thank the Lord for this missionary vocation which allowed me to exercise my Priestly ministry in a very tangible and fruitful way. My prayer to St. Francis Xavier bore much fruit. I'm sure that every Jubilarian present here, would have many marvellous episodes to narrate, and fascinate us all.



Summary of Fr. Provincial's Talk during the Jubilee of Confreres

Today we thank God, our Blessed Mother Mary and St. John Bosco for our 15 Jubilarians who have made significant contributions in our province. We celebrate today the milestone that they have achieved

in life. And on touching a milestone, it is time to thank God and celebrate. It is time to look back, count the blessings and acknowledge how the one who called you was faithful throughout "Behold I will be with you, even to the end of days". Such celebrations enable us to move on ahead with greater zest and vigour.

The Province and the Salesian family rejoice with our jubilarians and on behalf of all the confreres of the province and the Salesian family, I wish to offer them our hearty congratulations and pray that God fills their hearts with gratitude, joy and contentment and hope for the future. Together with them, we thank God for all the people who have brought them up to this day, their parents and family members, their friends and well wishers, vocation promoters, companions, teachers and superiors.

Looking back, we agree with St. Paul who said, though we are many, we form one body of Christ. Different parts of the body perform distinct activities bringing health, growth and wholeness to the entire body. In the same way, though each one of them performed different roles, portfolios and assignments in the province, they all have contributed very significantly for one purpose, that is, the growth of Salesian charism in the church in the northeast. Some of them, God has called to be frontline missionaries, others to be

evangelizers through quality and higher education, some as builders, not only of structures but dreams and aspirations of the young, others still are renowned formators, translators and writers of the Word of God and while still others, accompanied the poor, the neglected, the street children and the fatherless and homeless to be someone in life, to be loved and appreciated. In all these, the youth received their maximum attention and focus.

Each one of them is unique in their own way which reflects the greatness of God. Our charism and mission is so huge, dynamic and challenging and each one brings his own uniqueness and specialisation and thereby making his contribution to the church and the society so admirably huge and good.

Jubilee is the celebration of the centrality of God in our life. God's fidelity coupled with our own response and fidelity to the beautiful call, has made huge difference in making this world, especially of the young, a better place.

It is a celebration of the beauty of life spent at the service of others. When we decide to serve others, we need to be prepared for challenges and difficulties, rightly or wrongly. Sometimes there will be appreciations while at other times, they may not be forthcoming, there will be joys but there will also be misunderstandings and failures. But in all these, we are the best judges and our inner fidelity, truthfulness and serenity keep us moving and it is good that we do everything for the greater glory of God.

It is good to celebrate today the charism and the motto that kept you motivated. Like Don Bosco, we learned to say, give me nothing else but souls. The same charism has called us to give primacy to God, hear the invitation Salesians, be saints, be holy and never disappoint the dreams and aspirations of the young.

President David O McKay's words seem relevant to be quoted today. He says that "The true purpose of life is the perfection of humanity through individual effort, under



the guidance of God's inspiration. Real life is a response to the best within us. To be alive only to appetite of individualism, power and money, pleasure, pride, and not to goodness and kindness, purity and love, poetry, music, flowers, stars, God and eternal hopes, is to deprive one's self of the real joy of living".

Many a time our jubilarians would have heard these beautiful prophetic words of the master "The Spirit of the Lord GOD is upon me, Because the LORD has anointed me To bring good news to the afflicted; He has sent me to bind up the broken-hearted, To proclaim liberty to captives And freedom to prisoners; To proclaim the favourable year of the LORD And the day of vengeance of our God: To comfort all who mourn".

The words of Pope Francis to religious at the outset of the year of Consecrated life are meaningful and relevant to you. "I am counting on you 'to wake up the world' and to be prophets who witness to how Jesus

lived on this earth ... a religious must never abandon prophecy."

And how are we religious to be prophetic? Pope Francis says "... with the eloquence of your lives, lives which radiate the joy and beauty of living the Gospel and following Christ to the full. ... by learning from Jesus the meaning and practice of love. You will be able to love because you have His own heart"

"The consecrated life will not flourish as a result of brilliant vocation camps and programs, but only because the young people whom we meet find us attractive, and see us as men who are truly happy ... that our total self-giving in the service to the Church, to families and young people, to the elderly and the poor, brings us lifelong personal fulfilment."

Even as you celebrate your jubilee, remember, God is not finished with you yet, and He continues to count on you and need you to be the light of nations. Again, Pope Francis offers advice to us. He would like those in the Consecrated Life to be "experts in communion." that is to move from I to we. This is the desire of a Provident God cor unum, one heart.



PROVINCIAL COMMUNITY DAY 2019



The Provincial Community Day was celebrated on 24th August 2019 at Don Bosco Provincial House, Guwahati. It was good to see many confreres participating in the event, which was followed by the Jubilee celebrations of our confreres. It was a meaningful celebration, which stressed our unity and brotherhood in the Province. The day started well with the parish priests taking part in the morning prayer, during which we prayed for all the communities, our collaborators, our sick confreres, for vocations and the people for whom we work, especially the young. During the morning session, we welcomed Fr Ivo Coelho and his team from the Formation department in Rome. He then animated us on the revised Manual of Rectors which is being printed now. Saying that the Rector Major will sponsor the printing cost which will be printed for every SDB confrere worldwide, he said that the purpose of making copies available for each confrere is that the Rector can animate the community better if the individual confreres collaborate with him. He spoke about the Rector as the guardian of religious life and discipline in the community. He opined that fraternity in communities lands into problems, maybe because the faith aspect is weak. Hence, the more we strengthen the element of faith, the aspects of fraternity and discernment will be better experienced and lived. Dwelling significantly on the Educative Pastoral community (EPC), he said that if the EPC is healthy, the mission and apostolate will make greater progress and yield better results. In the afternoon session, I did a brief review and examination of the life of fraternity in the province. Projecting on the screen, the responses to the questionaires that were given to quite many confreres of the province earlier, on certain basic questions, such as, what makes you happy in

the province earlier, on certain basic questions, such as, what makes you happy in the province, what makes you worry about the future of the province, what five urgent lines of action does the province need to take, in what creative way could we promote vocations to the congregation and to give suggestions for the Provincial and his council to do better. The session gave me the opportunity to express my gratitude to everyone who help me daily to animate and govern the province well especially the Vice Provincial, the Economer, the Council members, the Rectors and all the confreres.



Summary of Fr. Provincial's talk to the Confreres

The General regulations of our Constitutions, number 42 says "Once a year let both the local and provincial communities, gathered around the rector and provincial respectively, celebrate the community feast-day as a sign of its fraternal communion and an expression of its gratitude.

I wish all of you a beautiful and fraternal celebration of our community day. Thank you for coming in large numbers to celebrate this annual event which is truly significant as it shows our unity and our contribution to build the provincial community. It is encouraging to see the joy and happy atmosphere during the celebrations that have gone by. Today we celebrate our fraternal communion and show our feeling of gratitude to God and to one another.

I take immense pride to belong to this unique province and presently be its Provincial. Taking a cue from the first article of our constitution, I say with a

feeling of humble gratitude that our beautiful province came into existence, not merely as a human venture but by the initiative of God. It is 100 years since the valiant pioneers set foot on this culturally and spiritually rich land of ours and since then generations of Salesians have relentlessly worked and contributed to the growth of the Church and our people especially the youth who are poorer and our achievements today have been nothing short of a "miracle".

As the Provincial, today, I see beauty, unity, happiness, growth and optimism in greater measure, around me. Our community practices of piety are taking deeper roots. In most of the communities, I find confreres making effort to be seekers of God, give primacy to God, our own sanctification and fidelity and working towards becoming experts in communion and in transparency. We need to keep it up or improve it. I can confidently say that where due place is given

to God, God will ensure t o manoeuvre us and sail us through to our destination safe and sound in these troubled waters.

God has accompanied us thus far and he keeps telling us, "Do

not be afraid. Behold I am with you". Recognize today Jesus accompanying us as he accompanied the two disciples to Emmaus and warmed their hearts. I feel privileged that the Centenary of the arrival of the Salesians to the Northeast will be celebrated during our tenure. The Centenary study and reflections should make us go back to hundred years and admire and imitate the missionary dynamism and dedication of the pioneers, both Indian and foreign.

I must say that we work as a team and for the poor. We have here in our midst young and old confreres who are vibrant, dynamic, focussed, missionary minded and wanting to do more for souls. The province has a very strong base as it has many confreres who are very generous in their work. It is an acknowledged fact that both the government and the general public acknowledge our contribution towards the growth in quality education and



empowerment of today's youth both in academic and vocational or skill education.

The number of vocations seems to be improving. All of you have been good enough to work very hard, under the leadership of the Vice Provincial to invite vocations. We have been insisting with the formation team to go extra mile in accompanying patiently and lovingly those who wished to be formed and prepare themselves to take our place in the near future. We feel convinced that even today our way of life is admired and is attractive to many a youth and we need to remember that vocations will come more through attraction and admiration than anything else. Promote vocations through personal contact and let our hostels become nurseries for vocations.

Our fraternal living is exemplary and good, though there is room for improvement. I request you to know your confreres. Love them as you would, your own biological brother or sister. Do not believe hearsays but verify what they say about your confreres. There may be a few who gossip, find fault, inconsiderate and lack sensitivity. I pray that our communities are places of joy, happiness and great accommodation. I pray that we kill individualism in any form.

Let the Rectors lead the community from the front - punctuality in prayer, having a depth of spirituality, with a capacity to

animate well, able to make time for confreres, boys, girls and people entrusted to their care. Most of the problems will be solved if the House councils could be held regularly, at least once a month, with an agenda well prepared and circulated in advance and all the members take an active part in it and ensure collective decision.

I am also asking your to take care of yourself and be generous with your confreres. Encourage them to rest well and enjoy good health of body and mind. Take care that they eat well. Pay lot of attention to empowering the poor. Do not get lost in the glamour of external appearance. I have seen so many smartly dressed students but when it comes to quality performance in examinations and in discipline, there is still very much to desire. Pay greater attention to the poorest of the poor.

I ask you to pray for me that I may do God's will rather than my own will. I need to discern God's will for the province. God's will often comes through collective searching, consultation and discussion.

Thank you for making this day truly fraternal. May God continue to bless our province and our many works. Remember, you are the province. May God bless you all and may our blessed mother intercede for us and may Don Bosco continue to urge us on.

MEETING OF RECTORS AND LEADERS **OF COMMUNITIES**



A meeting of Rectors and Leaders of Communities was held on 22nd June 2019 at Provincial House Guwahati. The meeting started with a Prayer Service animated by Fr. Maria Anthuvan, Provincial Secretary, to pray for the repose of the soul of late Fr. Jose Thiruthanathy. After the Prayer, Rev. Fr. Januarius S Sangma, Provincial, welcomed all the Rectors and Leaders of the meeting and especially Sr. Alphonsa Kurisinkal, FMA Provincial who was invited as the main speaker of the day. Sr. Alphonsa was felicitated by Fr. Joseph Teron, Vice Provincial and Fr. Maria Anthuvan, Secretary. Sr. Alphonsa spoke about the role of Rectors in animating and governing the communities. After the talk, she interacted with the participants, clarifying and answering their queries and misconceptions.

The Second session of the morning was animated by Rev. Fr. Provincial who started

with a YouTube video on the main traits of a leader. Basing on the video, Fr. Januarius said that good leaders have seven traits and these were: 1) They radiate positive energy; 2) They have a proactive attitude; 3) They delegate tasks, completely; 4) They are approachable; 5) They do what they expect of others; 6) They are accountable and 7) They are decisive. Quoting article number 176 of the Salesian Constitutions, he said that a "Rector is first in order of responsibility for it religious life..." He distributed a printed leaflet on the duties and responsibilities of a Rector - daily, monthly and yearly and requested everyone to follow it up. The members were also given sufficient time discussion and clarification.

The Third session of the day began after lunch break at 2.00 pm and this session was animated by Fr. Benny Alex, Provincial Economer. He spoke about financial discipline, irregularities in administration,

budget preparation etc. He presented the budget of the Province which was duly approved by the members. He also requested the communities to send in their contribution to implement certain designated works of the Province.

Before the closure of the meeting, Fr. Provincial asked the Rectors and communities to go through the Chapter documents in their respective communities, Copies were distributed all members. He also gave details regarding the Diamond Jubilee celebrations of the Province to be held on 17th of October in Guwahati. He read out the various duties and responsibilities given to certain individuals of the Province and to other Salesian Family members. The meeting ended at 4pm after some important announcements concerning forthcoming meetings and events.

PARISH PRIESTS' MEETING



The Meeting of Parish Priests of our Province was held on 23rd August 2019 at Don Bosco Provincial House, Guwahati. All the parish priests except one participated in it. There was a good atmosphere for quality input and discussion during the entire meeting. Dealing on the topic of Catechesis after Evangelisation, Fr Francis Hembrom spoke in great detail about the Small Christian Communities. Fr Denis T. Sangma spoke about how to organize the parish ministry effectively. In the afternoon session, the assembly planned the vocation strategy.

The highlight of the meeting was the animation by Fr Ivo Coelho, Fr Silvio

Roggia, Br Raymond Callo, and Fr Jose Kuttianimattathil who addressed the gathering in the evening. Fr Ivo stressed on formation which is to be lifelong. He cautioned us quoting Pope Francis, "Time is greater than space", i.e., the initiation of processes is more important than dominating spaces. It means that the inception of right processes today will bring about healthy and lasting fruits tomorrow. Fr Silvio spoke about family apostolate in

order to get youth strongly rooted in faith. Br Mon spoke on the need to integrate Salesian methodology into our pastoral programme of the parish. Fr Jose spoke about the need to do something urgently to prevent fragility in vocations in the province. As per the statistics and data available, the ING has departures which are incredibly high and it is time that we introspect on it.

SOUTH ASIA FORMATION COMMISSION MEETING

Don Bosco Provincial House, Guwahati, hosted the South Asian Formation Commission Meeting from 25th to 29th August 2019, for which 21 confreres participated from all the 12 provinces of South Asia. The main animators were Fr Ivo

Coelho, General Councillor for Formation, Fr Silvio Roggia, Formation Department, Br Raymond Callo, Formation Department, and Fr Jose Kuttianimattathil, SPCSA Delegate for Formation.



8TH CONVOCATION OF ASSAM DON BOSCO UNIVERSITY



The 8th Convocation of Assam Don Bosco University was held on 7th September 2019 at the Tapesia campus of the University. Prof. Jagdish Mukhi, the Honourable Governor of Assam, presided over the function and delivered the Presidential Address.

The Chancellor, Fr. Januarius S. Sangma, and the Vice Chancellor, Fr. (Dr) Stephen Mavely also spoke at the solemn function. A host of dignitaries from Civil, Church and Academic institutions of the region also attended the occasion

In his presidential address, he said, "The government of India wants to establish the country as an 'AI Garage of the world' to export and deploy it in the whole developing world. It will not only bring about economic and military growth, but also foster social inclusion, calling it, 'AI for all'. AI research in India will focus on increasing access and affordability of quality healthcare; enhancing farmer's income, farm productivity and reduction of wastage; improving access and quality of education; efficient connectivity for the burgeoning urban population; and smarter and safer modes of transportation and better traffic and congestion problems."

This strategy of the Government aims to enhance and empower young Indians with the skills to find quality jobs, invest in

research sectors that can maximise economic growth and social impact, and scale Indian-made AI solutions that can be implemented to the rest of the world, added the Governor.

The Governor appreciated the University for creating and disseminating knowledge and skills in the frontier areas of education. developing reservoir of youth power, which effectively participate in nation building.

The Chancellor of the University, Fr. Januarius Sangma said, "Universities should contribute concretely to upholding democratic values; foster respect, fraternity, dignity of labour, non-violence, standing for truth and principles, upholding the dignity of life ... This is how we build a nation; this is how we build humanity."

Giving a report about the University, the Vice Chancellor Fr (Dr) Stephen Mavely, said, "Assam Don Bosco University is becoming a nerve centre for the development of the North Eastern Region. The University has taken up development initiatives in 42 villages that surround the University. It is an ideal location for the packed extension and social commitment programmes of the University. It's in our plans to ensure that every graduate of our University will have committed themselves to several months of meaningful social work during the course of their study at the University."

"Our Internal Quality Assurance Cell is channelizing the efforts and measures of the university towards academic excellence. It has been working actively as the think tank



initiator and monitor of all quality enhancement works of the university," added the Vice Chancellor.

A total of 816 degrees were conferred: 212 were from Bachelor of Technology, 21 from Master of Technology, 43 from Master of Computer Application, 37 from Master of Business Administration, 67 from Master of Social Work, 21 from MSc Psychology, 14 from MSc Physics, 32 from MSc Chemistry, 15 from MSc Biotechnology, 2 from MSc Biochemistry, 21 from MSc Microbiology, 42 from MSc Zoology, 12 from MA Education, 28 from Bachelor of Computer Application, 33 from Bachelor of

Commerce and 13 from BA Philosophy. 12 doctoral degrees also conferred in various disciplines. Under the online education programme, 191 from across the globe were also conferred degrees in various disciplines. Gold Medals under various categories were awarded to 20 outstanding graduates with the highest Cumulative Grade Point Average in each program. The Chancellor's and the Vice Chancellor's medals, for overall outstanding performance and notable contribution to campus life were awarded to two graduating students at the Convocation.

This ambitious project of the province of Guwahati will give hope and future to thousands of students who want to pursue higher education from the region.




MEETING OF HEADS OF COMMISSIONS

The annual Regional Pastoral Conference of North East India concluded with a resolution to better care for the youth of the region to make a better Church and Society on 1st September at Don Bosco Institute, Kharghuli, Guwahati.

The Meeting began at 9.45 am, with a short inaugural programme in the Mario Hall, in which the resource person Rev. Fr. Robert Simon, Youth Delegate for the South Asia Region was welcomed with Phoolom Gamocha and a bouquet of flowers. After which a meaningful and prayerful song entitled "Who Am I?" was played on the screen. Fr. Perunneparambil Jose led the opening prayer, after which Fr. C.V. George

was asked to give a short reflection on the Salesian Youth Ministry. After him, Fr. Provincial, Fr. Januarius S. Sangma, strongly spoke about the need to have a house council regularly in all the houses of the province, in order to build an Educative Pastoral Community (EPC) which would bring out an Educative Pastoral Plan (EPP) which incorporates all the Four Dimensions of Education and Culture, Education to Faith, social experiences and vocational guidance.

The First thing that the resource person, Fr. Robert Simon did, was to present a book



'Salesian Youth Ministry: Frame of Reference, which the Salesian Congregation has drawn out for the promotion of uniformity of Salesian style of animation and accompaniment throughout the Salesian world. Then, Fr. Robert Simon clearly talked about a dire need of running our schools, parishes, technical schools, and all types of sectors in the province with a Salesian style of administration and animation. And the Salesian way of running our presences lies in adopting a Salesian methodology of planning, animating and accompanying which is summarized in the Salesian concept called 'EPC' - Educative Pastoral Community in which SDBs form a nucleus of animators. The outcome of the EPC is called 'EPP' - Educative Pastoral Plan. in which all the activities and programmes of the Centre are designed in such a way as to provide a holistic formation to our youth, especially those who are poor. Thus, the EPP takes care of the four dimensions of Salesian system of education. That is, every activity is smeared with educational, cultural, social and vocational values. This is called a Salesian Youth Ministry, different and unique from any other youth ministries that exist in the Church said Fr. Simon.

On the second day, he animated on Salesian Youth Movement. He said that all the Salesian houses should encourage all the groups, clubs, and associations etc. present

in a Salesian set up and other groups and movements in the neighbourhood too, should be invited cordially to join the Salesian Youth Movement. Last one hour of the second day animation was dedicated to group discussion in which the participants were asked to suggest a way forward as to how to bring to awareness, ownership and execution of the Salesian Youth Ministry and Salesian Youth Movement in all the houses of the province with a special reference to EPC. As a response, the participants suggested that there has to be a collective effort from the part of each community and more especially it has to be powerfully endorsed by the Provincial and his council. It was decided that all the YSs who were absent for the programme would have the same programme organized in the month of August. As a resolution, each of the Youth Service Coordinators (YSC) present for the programme should instruct their community members with regard to EPC, EPP and SYM; inaugurate officially SYM in their communities as soon as possible. The meeting concluded with a vote of thanks proposed by Fr. Pojit Marak and a hymn to Don Bosco.

A review of 'Don Bosco Schools for Excellence' in ten Provinces was done effectively. They also suggested that there should be separate grade for the rural schools and the urban schools and the assessors should be from different provinces.

The Second Day began with a draft presentation of 'Don Bosco School Policy.' The group were of the opinion that this policy was well prepared and suggested the need for an accompanying manual to be prepared along with the School Policy. A small team constituted to compile the manual included Fr. Maria Charles, Fr. Davis Manipadam, Fr. John Parankimalil (PD) and Bro. Edwin Arokiadas. The team is expected to put together various policies and guidelines about schools together by the middle of August.

ORDAINED DEACONS





The 23rd Triennial Conference of the Xavier Board of Higher Education was inaugurated at Don Bosco Institute, Kharguli, Guwahati today. The Xavier Board founded in 1951, today represents 352 institutes of Higher Education in India including Deemed and Private Universities. Most Rev. Dr. Thomas D'Souza, Archbishop of Kolkata and Chairman of the Catholic Bishops Conference of India's Commission for Education and Culture inaugurated the event. Quoting the Education Policy of the Catholic Church, he stressed that "the most important indicator of a country's progress is the state of its higher education." Fr. Leslie Moras, President of Xavier Board, Fr. Dr. Sebastian Ousepparampil, Regional President, Eastern & North Eastern Region, Sr. Dr. Annamma Philip, Secretary General, Fr. Dr. Stephen Mavely, Vice Chancellor of Assam Don Bosco University, Fr. PD John, Director of DBI and Fr. Dr. Emmanuel

Kallarackal, Vice President, Xavier Board were eminent speakers at the inaugural function.

The keynote address "Re-visioning Higher Education in India - Challenges and Strategies" was delivered by Prof. N.V. Varghese, Vice-Chancellor, National University of Educational Planning and Administration, New Delhi. He began by stating that "Universities as we know them today will not exist in the near future!" Universities should produce not necessarily "trained" graduates but "trainable" graduates who can be employable today and in the future. Any re-visioning of Higher Education should look at what Universities are "good for" rather than at what universities are "good at".

The three day event will discuss the draft National Education Policy 2019 and other relevant topics affecting Higher Education in India. Prof. François Mabille, Secretary General of International Federation of Catholic Universities (IFCU), Paris will speak on Internationalization of Higher Education. Possible future directions in Internationalization of Higher Education will be discussed under the leadership of independent researcher from JNU, Mr. Eldo Mathews and Prof. M.A. Kalam from Krea University will discuss Tribulations of Mainstreamed Higher Education. Democracy, Secularism and Education, the

three pillars of modern education will be discussed by Dr. Anitha Kurup from National Institute of Advanced Studies. Most Rev. Dr. Thomas Menamparampil, Archbishop Emeritus of Guwahati will lead the discussion on getting people to think and develop

a sense of social responsibility. Prof. Philip Altbach, Director of the Center for International Higher Education, Lynch School of Education, Boston College, USA will lead the discussion on higher education at a turning point. A visit to Assam Don Bosco University in the city is also planned.

The three-day conference will end with election of office bearers for the prestigious Xavier Board of Higher Education in India.

Fr. Silveira was born on 8 December 1966 in Panjim, State of Goa, India. He did his novitiate in Nashik, and made his first Profession on May 31, 1985. He made his Perpetual Profession on May 25, 1992, in Mumbai; he was ordained a priest on December 21, 1995, in his hometown.



Fr C.V George is celebrating 80 years of his life with 60 years of profession and 50 years of priestly ordination. Born on 31st March 1937 in Thidanad, Erattuppetta, Diocese of Changanacherry, Fr C.V George is known for his simplicity, love for trees and his expertise in plating trees. Fr George has worked in many mission stations of the Provinces in the States of Assam, Tripura and Meghalaya. He has done his licentiate in Catechetics from UPS, Rome from 1967 to 1970 and is well versed in languages like Italian, German, Latin besides Malayalam, Santali, Hindi, Assamese and Khasi.

He has been Vice Provincial of Guwahati Province from 7th March 1979 to 15th February 1982. He was also the Economer from 8th January 1985 to 1st February 1991.

In a candid interview with Fr C.V. George. Ms Avishka Phukan Staff of Don Bosco Communications got to know more about his life and Mission in the North East India.

INTERVIEW WITH FR. C.V. GEORGE, SDB

1. Hello Fr. George, Good morning! I am Avishka from Don Bosco Communications. I'm asked to do an interview with you. Let me begin by asking you, what is your full name? Does your name have any special meaning? Can you tell me something about your native place?

Fr. George: My full name is Chittapanatt Varkey George. My name means the uncle who extracts oil from coconut. My native place is in Thidanad, Erattuppetta, Diocese of Changanacherry in Kerala. It is a beautiful place surrounded by paddy fields, rubber plantations, hills and plains.

2. Who were your Parents? What do you remember about them in particular?

Fr. George: My father's name was Varkey Chittappanatt and my mother's name was Anna Thekkumcherikunnel. My father was a businessman who ran grocery shops in the neighbourhood and my mother was a home maker.

Our parents brought up the 10 children (3 sons and 7 daughters) in Christian faith. They themselves were devout Christians and committed their lives to the Lord. They taught us various prayers and prepared us for sacramental life. Devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary and praying of the holy Rosary were very much part of our lives.

3. What about your family? Where are they now and what are are they doing? Have they visited you here?

Fr. George: As I mentioned to you, we are 10 of us consisting of 7 daughters and 3 sons -Mary, Anne, Joseph, Rosa, Aleykutty, George, Teresa, Sebastian, Bridgit 1st, Bridgit 2nd (Bridgit 1st died at the age of 2 years).

My eldest sister Mary got married in Kerala, then next to her was my second sister Anna who joined the FCC and became Sr Canisius. She is currently in Pala in Kerala. Next to her was my brother Joseph who got married and had 6 children. But unfortunately he died. After him was my sister named Rosa who got married and one of her daughter's became a nun and joined the FMA in Assam and now she is in Cambodia.

Then there was myself who joined the Salesians of Don Bosco. Next to me was my younger sister Teresa who joined FMA and became Sr Teresa and is currently in Boko. Next to her is my brother Sebastian who joined the Kanjirpally Diocese in Kerala and became Fr Sebastian. The youngest of all is my sister Bridgit who joined the FMA and became Sr Bridgit and is currently Superior in St. Mary's School Guwahati.

4. Tell us something about your childhood days.

Fr. George: I was born in the year 1937. Life then was very simple. I went to the school that belonged to the church named Acchamma Memorial School. The School was built during the British era. Even though my father was a businessman, my ancestral family members were farmers.

We had a gramophone at home. And so our neighbours would often come to our house to listen to it. It was our only form of entertainment. In school we used to play simple games with rubber balls. I was a studious student. We used to go to the Church every morning before and in the evening after our school. Bible reading and prayers were very important part in our childhood days.

5. Who inspired you to join the Salesian Congregation?

Fr. George: I drew inspirations from those who worked in the missions as nuns and priests in our neighbourhood parishes. In Kerala the children of most of the Catholic homes knew what it means to be a priest and nun. My own second eldest sister Sr Canisius became a nun then and went to a place called Pala (Kerala).

In my family my Father used to buy Lottery tickets from Don Bosco Kolkata. So from him I came to know about the Salesian Congregation.

6. Why did you choose to come to north-east India?

Fr. George: I feel God brought me here. I left home for missions in the year 1951 and came to Sonada in West Bengal. While in Sonada in 1953, we visited Barpeta Don Bosco for our holidays now and then. So that was my first Salesian experience in the North East. Then in 1957 when I joined the Congregation of Don Bosco in Shillong it was then the capital

of Assam. We stayed in Shillong for 1 year. Then I went back to Sonada to complete my studies. Then I came to Shillong in 1963 to study Theology and in 1967 I was ordained a Priest. I went to Italy in 1967 and stayed there for 3 years doing Catechetical Studies. Then in 1970 I came back to Guwahati and visited Doomdooma, Dibrugarh and Shillong. Since 1970s I have been in the Northeast working in various places.

7. Where did you have your initial formation? - Aspirantate - Pre-Novitiate - Novitiate.

Fr. George: My Aspirantate was in Bandel in West Bengal, my Pre Novitiate was in Sonada and My Novitiate was in Shillong.

8. When was your First Profession? What do you remember of that day?

Fr. George: My First Profession was in the year 1957. In 1956 we went to Sonada and prepared for that along with 18 boys together for profession. The whole ceremony was carried out by our Superiors in the Provincial House in Shillong. We had a Church service and made our vows. We were happy that since we were preparing ourselves to join the congregation and become Salesians, our dream of becoming a member of the Congregation was coming true.

9. Where did you have your post-novitiate formation and other studies?

Fr. George: My Post novitiate was in Sonada and Darjeeling in our Lady's House that is the Salesian House. My practical Training was in Dibrugarh and for other studies I went to Italy.

10. Tell us something about your initial mission experiences.

Fr. George: My first mission experience started from Don Bosco School in Dibrugarh in the year 1970 to 1973. There I joined as a teacher and also looked after the boarding school. From there I was posted in Shillong in 1973 in Savio Juniorate School (Aspirant ate) as a priest. Then I changed the house to Don Bosco School Shillong and was in charge of financial matters. From there I joined Don Bosco Technical School.

11. Where did you do your practical training?

Fr. George: My Practical Training began in Dibrugarh in the year 1963. The school building was new and there were about 100 boarders and being with them was a great experience. We were 3 brothers in charge of them.

12. Which are the places where you have worked? What do you remember about those places and the persons you met there? Do you remember anyone in particular?

Fr. George: Yes. I have worked in Don Bosco School, Dibrugarh, Don Bosco Technical School, Shillong, Savio Juniorate, Shillong, in Kumarikatta for 9 years, in Umran in Shillong and as Vice Provincil in Guwahati.

Yes when I was studying in Sonada we met Fr Pulingathil as a cleric as he was not a priest then. He taught theology and was a very good

educator. He was a very religious, law abiding person who had a lot of patience in teaching us young boys then. And then there was an elderly father Fr Paviotti (in Sonada), Fr Francis (Shillong, Confessor), Fr Varkey (Aspirantate Shillong), Fr Comba (Met him while studying theology in Shillong) and so on. Throughout my formation years and even after becoming a priest, these Fathers inspired me a lot.

13. You have been many years in north-east India. How has the region changed during these years?

Fr. George: I have stayed in different parts of the North East since my first arrival here in the year 1957. At that time the entire North East was considered as Assam and the people here belong to various tribes, they speak various languages. We learnt a number of languages from the previous older Fathers. The region has definitely changed from then to now specially the mindset of the parents have changed towards education. Previously we had to go and meet the parents in the villages and push them to send their children to school to learn but now the Parents take active part in educating the children.

14. What do you tell us about the Salesian vocation today?

Fr. George: Salesian vocation is flourishing today because of local vocations. Advance of technology and communications have helped in this. In our time there were lots of challenges like the language barrier, transportation barriers, and communication barrier. We had to write letters to people and wait for the replies that would come after months later. So the growth was slow then. But now we are able to reach more and more people and this has helped the world to become mentally one by becoming friends with one another through education. We are very closely connected to the youth now. Media has also played an important role in helping us to reach out. But comforts and other attractions readily available today, there is also less perseverance today.

15. In your opinion, what are the reasons behind the decline in the number of vocations?

Fr. George: The decline in the number of vocations has many reasons behind it. Today the world is open to so much recreational activities. There are lots of temptations and attractions to distract those interested in becoming Salesians. Children now have access to many recreations which gives them the access to enjoy their lives and not learn. With education they are now able to afford a luxurious life which they are not willing to give up.


16. Do you have any regrets?

17. What message would you like to give young Salesians today?

Fr. George: My Message is that we should follow Don Bosco's method of living with the youth, love what the youth love and teach the

right principles of life, live the right way and invite others to live right, follow what the church is teaching without dividing so that we will be united eternally.





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
